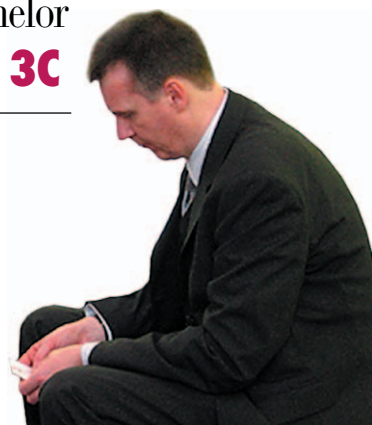

# Hall of Famers

## Transportation pioneers Carl Mickey Sr., Willis Slane Jr. slated for induction

**HIGH POINT** – One by land, the other by sea.

Two prominent High Point businessmen – truck body manufacturer Carl Mickey Sr. and yachting pioneer Willis Slane Jr. – will be inducted into the N.C. Transportation Hall of Fame this fall.

They are among eight transportation pioneers from the state chosen for the honor.

"This is so unexpected, and I'm just thrilled," says the 85-year-old Mickey, who transformed Mickey Truck Bodies from a small blacksmith shop started by his dad into an international company that owns nearly a 70-percent share of the beverage truck body market.

"I never think of our company as being that prominent – to me it's a glorified blacksmith shop," Mickey says with a chuckle. "I'm used to working on a dirt floor with an anvil."

The fact is, though, that Mickey Truck Bodies – which celebrated its 100th anniversary in 2004 – is a global leader in the truck body manufacturing industry.

Other than delivering newspapers and shining shoes, Mickey says working at his father's company is the only job he ever had.

"I'd go back with him at night when he had something to do," Mickey says. "During my grammar-school days, I'd come by after school, too."

The company was founded in 1904 as the W.F. Mickey Body Co. by Will Franklin Mickey to make the iron ring for wooden wagon wheels and open wooden bodies for hauling ice.

Since then, the company has blossomed – under Mickey's guidance – into a premier manufacturer of state-of-the-art bodies and trailers made entirely of aluminum.

The late Willis Slane Jr., who died in 1965, pioneered the use of fiberglass in boat

construction as the founder of Hatteras Yachts. The company, founded in High Point but now headquartered in New Bern, produced its first sportfishing fiberglass yacht here in 1960.

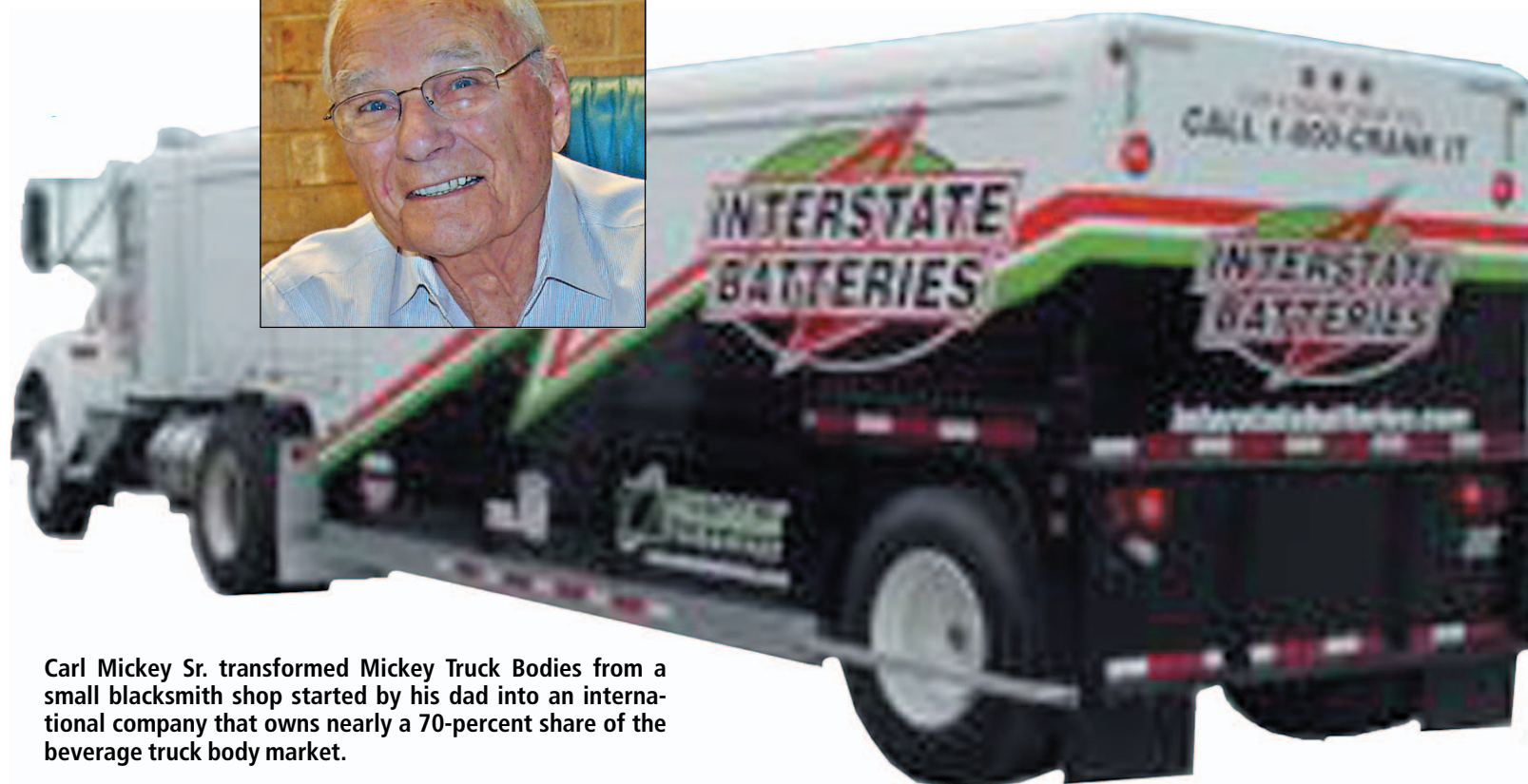
Slane's son, Tom Slane – owner of Slane Marine in High Point – recalls that the seed for Hatteras Yachts was planted on one of his father's many fishing trips to Hatteras Island with his buddies.

"They had the old wooden boats, and when it was real rough off Hatteras, they wouldn't take them out," Slane says. "So when they couldn't go fishing, they would sit around playing cards and sipping their favorite beverage."

One day in 1959, during one of the island's infamous nor'easters, Slane told his buddies, "One day somebody will make a boat that can handle these types of conditions, and we'll be able to fish instead of having to sit here and play cards."

The men challenged Slane to build such a boat.

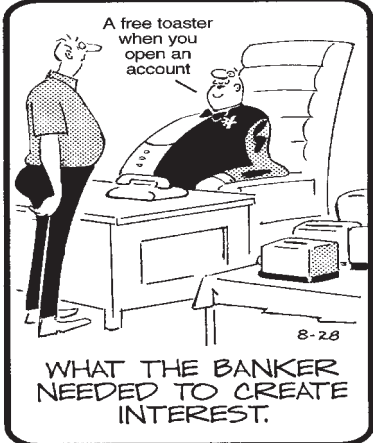

When you become declarer, you've promised to win a specified number of tricks. But promises can be like babies: easy to make but hard to deliver.

Today's South promised to win 10 tricks at hearts but delivered nine. He took the ace of clubs, drew trumps and led a diamond: jack, queen, king. East shifted to the queen of spades, and the defense took two spades. East's nine of diamonds won a trick later, and South went down.

How can South make good on his 10-trick promise?

**CORRECT MOVE**

After South draws trumps, he takes the ace of diamonds, cashes his high clubs and leads a diamond. When West plays the jack or ten, South's correct move is to play low from dummy.

As the cards lie, South is safe: If West wins the trick, he is end-played, forced to lead a spade or concede a ruff-sluff, and East can't gain by overtaking with the king of diamonds to lead a spade. If West had the king of diamonds, South would still get home: West would be end-played after he cashed the king.

**DAILY QUESTION**

You hold: S 6 3 H K J 7 4 D A Q 8 4 C Q 6 2. Your partner opens one spade, you respond two diamonds, he bids three clubs and you try 3NT. Partner next rebids four clubs. What do you say?

Partner's "high reverse" to three clubs showed extra strength, but some of your red-suit honors won't be useful to him. Hence you must keep your foot on the brake. Bid four spades. Since you didn't support the spades earlier, partner won't expect good support.

"My father said, 'OK, toss some money in and we'll start a boat company,' and that's how it started," Slane says.

As the company grew, so did its boats; still an industry leader, Hatteras now produces a line of yachts ranging from 63 to 100 feet long.

Tom Slane points out that in addition to his father being a pioneer, the success of Hatteras Yachts has had a huge impact on boat-building in North Carolina.

"There are numerous boat manufacturers that are leaving other states and coming to our state, because of economic conditions and support for boat-building here," he explains.
